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SBA Offers Disaster Assistance To Ohio Businesses Economically Affected By Hurricane – Force Winds

WASHINGTON – Low-interest disaster loans are available in Ohio to small businesses, and most private, non-profit organizations of all sizes affected by hurricane-force winds on September 14, 2008, U. S. Small Business Administration Acting Administrator Sandy K. Baruah announced today.

SBA Acting Administrator Baruah made the loans available following a letter from Ohio Governor Ted Strickland on January 13, requesting a disaster declaration by the SBA. The declaration covers Franklin, Greene, Hamilton and Montgomery counties and the adjacent counties of Butler, Clark, Clermont, Clinton, Darke, Delaware, Fairfield, Fayette, Licking, Madison, Miami, Pickaway, Preble, Union and Warren in the State of Ohio; Dearborn and Franklin counties in the State of Indiana; and Boone, Campbell and Kenton counties in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

“We look forward to working with the State of Ohio making our loans available to small businesses that sustained economic injury due to the hurricane-force winds,” said Baruah. “We will be swift in our efforts to help the business owners with their working capital needs.”

Eligible small businesses and most private, non-profit organizations of all sizes may qualify for loans up to \$2 million. The SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Interest rates are available at 4 percent with loan terms up to 30 years. The SBA determines eligibility for the loans based on the size and type of the business and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and based on each applicant’s financial condition.

“The SBA can help these small businesses, and most private, non-profit organizations overcome their economic losses by offering working capital loans, but the help cannot start until they submit an SBA Disaster Loan application to us,” said Thomas K. Mueller, SBA’s Columbus, Ohio District Director.
